### SUMMARY OF QUIZ INPUT

Of Alignvote sessions completed, how are people answering? Here are the answers people are entering, sorted most frequent to least frequent. The "Avg. Importance" column indicates what the average slider-bar movement was. 50 is the default, 100 is highest (extremely important), and 0 is lowest (unimportant).

This is simply cumulative logs of how people are answering.** We do not de-dupe for multiple answers, though we are now logging IP addresses and will be able to filter these to unique IPs in the future.
